❖ **MAJOR EVENTS IN FEBRUARY DURING THE WAR BETWEEN THE STATES**

**1861**

Feb. 1<sup>st</sup> – Texas secedes from the Union

Feb. 4<sup>th</sup> - Seceded states (6) meet in convention in Montgomery, AL

Feb. 9<sup>th</sup> – Jefferson Davis elected Provisional President of the Confederacy

**1862**

Feb. 6<sup>th</sup> – Fort Henry on the Tennessee River surrenders to Union Flag Officer Foote after the majority of the Confederate garrison had removed itself to Fort Donelson

Feb. 8<sup>th</sup> – Battle of Roanoke Island, NC

Feb. 13<sup>th</sup> to 16<sup>th</sup> – Battle for Fort Donelson on the Cumberland River

Feb. 21<sup>st</sup> – Engagement at Valverde, New Mexico Territory

Feb. 25<sup>th</sup> – Federal troops under Maj. Gen. Buell occupy Nashville, TN

### **1863**

Feb. 7<sup>th</sup> – Three blockade-runners successfully eluded the Federal blockading fleet and entered Charleston, SC

Feb. 28<sup>th</sup> – the Federal Monitor Montauk destroyed The Southern privateer Rattlesnake (formally the CSS Nashville)

### **1864**

Feb. 1<sup>st</sup> – Lincoln orders 500,000 men to be drafted for 3 years or duration of the war

Feb. 14<sup>th</sup> – Federal forces under Sherman capture Meridian, MS

Feb. 17<sup>th</sup> – CSS *H.L. Hunley* sinks the USS *Housatonic* off Charleston, SC

Feb. 20<sup>th</sup> – Battle of Olustee or Ocean Pond, FL took place resulting in a Confederate Victory for troops under the command of Brig. Gen. Joseph Finegan.

Feb. 22<sup>nd</sup> – Nathan Bedford Forrest defeats Federals at the battle of Okolona, MS

Feb. 27<sup>th</sup> – Federal prisoners begin arriving at Camp Sumter (Andersonville) near Americus, GA

### **1865**

Feb. 1<sup>st</sup> – Sherman's Carolina Campaign in full operation. Sherman begins his march into South Carolina from Savannah, GA and Beaufort, SC

Feb 5<sup>th</sup> to 7<sup>th</sup> – Battle of Hatcher's Run, VA

Feb. 6<sup>th</sup> – Robert E. Lee is appointed General-in-Chief of the Armies of the Confederacy

Feb. 17<sup>th</sup> – Sherman's troops capture Columbia, SC and Confederate forces evacuate Charleston, SC

Feb. 22<sup>nd</sup> – Wilmington, NC falls to Federal forces
